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#### LETTER FROM THE MCRD MUSEUM FOUNDATION BOARD PRESIDENT

Members, supporters, volunteers, and staff, I hope you all had a joyous holiday; however you celebrated, and an even better start to 2025. For your foundation, 2025 is an important year. Firstly, we join in our Corps-wide celebration of the 250th year since the founding of the Continental Marines. The party will span the entire year, culminating in our 250th Birthday in November. Stay tuned to our website, the Depot Dispatches and our monthly updates for news, scheduled events, and even swag opportunities. At MCRD San Diego specifically, we celebrate the early days of the depot. In 1925, one hundred years ago, the first phase of depot construction was complete, with the arcade buildings (Bldg. 1-7) as well as the five senior officer quarters completed and occupied - Quarters 1 welcoming its first occupant, two-time Medal of Honor recipient BGen Smedley Butler. For all of you history buffs, the events of that period, along with updated coverage of the last 25 of our first one hundred years, is laid out in our updated book 'Making Marines for One Hundred Years' the Centennial History of MCRD San Diego, which will be available in our gift shop and on-line, in March or April.

Our reason for being is to support the Command Museum, and the Depot's history programs – helping tell the story of our Corps, and MCRD San Diego specifically, to a wide audience of visitor. Several exciting and innovative concepts are being worked currently to improve the quality of support. Firstly, we are working to improve the visitor experience, with internet based selfas well guided tours. as technology enhancements for docents and staff visitor escorts. Secondly, we are looking at the entire depot in historical terms, attempting to extend that improved, or augmented visitor experience to several significant historical locations outside the museum walls. And third we continue to work to create opportunities to extend our presence virtually, to eventually be able to welcome online visitors to explore all our museum, and historic depot have to offer.

Physical improvements to the museum are under way as well. I hope you have all had a chance to see the new landscaping and seating in the front at the South side of the building. Great sponsors, primarily an incredible team from Home Depot made that happen — along with some significant sweat equity from our Executive Director, our staff, and volunteers. The next phase, also supported by Home Depot, will be a make-over of the courtyard in preparation for a future Path of Valor installation, honoring Marine Corps service and veterans from Vietnam to present day.



### TALES OF THE DEPOT: SERGEANT SAS

A legend is a traditional story sometimes regarded as historical but unauthenticated. The Marine Corps Recruit Depot has developed countless legends since its inception, and their authenticity waxes and wanes depending on the story-teller. If you went to boot camp aboard MCRD San Diego, your legends often begin and end with the infamous Drill Instructors that made your life a living hell. If you worked on the base the legends are often tied to the buildings and events that have occurred over the years.

One such legend is the story of Sgt Sas. A retired Marine, Sas worked on base as the Headquarters Custodian. He also lived in the Depot Headquarters Building. His room was a shrine to the Corps; spartan and neat, maintained with rigid discipline by the legend himself.

Many Marines have claimed to have received a guided tour of the historic abode, and countless others have retold how Sas always had a sea story to recount as he made his daily rounds of the base ensuring all was secure. His residence on base started in the late 1930s, and he is the only retired Marine to have lived in the Headquarters building.

Adam T. Sasiadek was born in 1902 in Poland. He moved to the United States at the age of 2, settling in New York with his family. He first enlisted in the Marine Corps on July 17, 1922. His Marine Corps record lists numerous bases and stations as well as multiple deployments that included service in Port Au Prince, Haiti and Manila in the early 1930s.

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He was stationed on Marine Barracks at Norfolk Virginia, the Naval Ammunition Depot in Dover, New Jersey, and Marine Barracks Quantico, Virginia. Multiple assignments on ships including the USS Henderson, USS Vaga and USS Nitro also pepper his record.

Frequent movements are common among Marines of this era, and as he has various assignments, it may be assumed he was a basic infantryman of the time with a variety of duties. Sas was also in and out of Marine Base, San Diego over the years. He first arrived on base in September 1934 as a PFC in the Sixth Marines, Fleet Marine Force, one of the many units located on the base. In December of 1934 he was at Camp Kearney in San Diego County still with the 6thMarines, attached to Headquarters Company. In 1937 the Regiment traveled to Shanghai, China and PFC Sas is now a Cpl.

In the late 1930s the Marines were frequently shipped out to quell uprisings in China, Haiti and Nicaragua. The legend of Sas is birthed in this environment. In his official oral history Sas tells the interviewer that he spent a lot of time working behind the scenes, digging up dirt on the enemy, and leading a clandestine life. He tells the interviewer that he was in a lot of places, but nobody knew where he was. The US Department of Veterans Affairs lists two enlistment periods 17 July 1922 to 16 June 1927 and 16 January 1941 to 31 Dec 1952. The official muster rolls also list numerous periods of active service from 1922 through 1946.

n the 1940 Federal census Adam T. Sasiadek is a Naturalized Citizen residing at 2238 31st Street in San Diego. His occupation is listed as Nurse. Also listed at the same address are Clarence B. and Ella B. Rust. Sas is listed at the same address in the San Diego City Directory for 1941.

I In July of 1941 Sas is once again on the Marine Base in San Diego attached to Base Headquarters. He serves with this unit until April 1945 when he is attached to the General Service Unit, 11th Reserve District and his final muster roll entry is October 1946 with the same unit now located at the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Armory in Los Angeles.

After the war, Sas is once again on Marine Base San Diego only now he is a civilian. He first appears in the base newspaper, The Chevon, in a March 11, 1949 article. The article includes a photo of Sas walking around base with a pet duck. His occupation is listed as Administration Building Custodian. In October 1954 the Chevron notes that Sas, Custodian of the Depot Headquarters Building, has been named the First Top Civilian on base by the Depot Commander.

Sas continues to make news with a
Leatherneck magazine article in October 1957.
The Leatherneck article includes a photo of
Sas and his squared away quarters on base. In
October 1959 the Chevron has a photo of Sas
noting that he "Spars To Keep In Shape." In
1959 Sgt Adam T. Sasiadek, USMC Retired,
reviewed the Depot parade with BGen James
L. Day, Deputy Assistant Depot Commander.
The legend ends with this final listing that
seems to be the retirement from his civilian job
on base. Records of his death, and his final
resting place have yet to be uncovered.

Historic places are often defined by their physical spaces; sweeping vistas dotted with grand architecture created by renown masters. The Marine Corps Recruit Depot is one of those places. The buildings and archways, balconies and miles of corridors are stately. The grinder is worn from the countless boots that have traversed it. When the wind blows, the walls seem to echo with the voices that have inhabited them. Sgt Sas is one of those voices, and his legend lives on in each of us.



## MCRD MUSEUM FOUNDATION **QUARTERLY BREAKFAST**

On January 14, 2025, The MCRD Museum Foundation hosted their second Quarterly Breakfast of the year with Bob Lehman as their guest speaker. Bob Lehman is a Marine combat veteran having served in the Persian Gulf War based out of Camp Pendleton. He attended recruiting school here at MCRD before finishing his career as a Marine recruiter in Chicago.

Today, Bob is Executive Director of the San Diego Museum Council, one of the nation's largest associations of regional museums and cultural institutions. In this role, he advocates on behalf of more than 80 museums and cultural institutions throughout San Diego County including the MCRD Museum. He is also Vice Chair of the San Diego County Arts & Culture Commission representing downtown and Balboa Park. He is also the current Chair of the regional arts advocacy group San Diego ART Matters and serves on the statewide board of Californians for the Arts.



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Bob gave a presentation on how the MCRD SD Command Museum can better integrate itself into the museum community, not only within San Diego but also extending south to Tijuana. The SD Museum Council offers numerous opportunities to raise awareness of museums within the community and has proposed increasing marketing efforts. The MCRD Command Museum will have the chance to host an experiential exhibit group that will tour the museum's exhibits and provide feedback on what the public finds most interesting, helping to promote and maintain the museum with support from the MCRD Museum Foundation. The Foundation will also work on connecting other museum members with our own to create new experiences that highlight the historic military community here in San Diego.
